

Joseph Blackbourn is given home detention after being sentenced on drug and weapon charges.

Joseph Blackbourn has been given ten months home detention after being sentenced on drug and weapon charges in Wellington District Court on Friday Morning. The charges included supplying methamphetamine, cannabis, ecstasy, and fantasy-type substances. The weapons charges came for possessing two tasers.

The charges arose from two searches, one at a vacant house in Upper Hutt, and the second at his home. His phone was also searched.

Judge Davidson sentenced Joseph Blackbourn to ten months home detention as opposed to being sent to jail as Joseph had checked into an Auckland-based drug rehabilitation facility, and Davidson felt that jail would undo all the good work Joseph had made. The conditions given were that Joseph would attend any alcohol and drug programme directed by his probation officer, not to possess or consume any alcohol or illegal drugs, forfeit the cash he made from the drugs, and the destruction of the drugs and tasers.

Local Government Minister Simon Watts has decided to use the Commerce Commission to monitor Wellington Water

It was announced on Friday that Local Government Minister Simon Watts has decided to use legislation in the Local Water Done Well reforms, to allow the Commerce Commission to monitor Wellington Water. This requires Wellington Water to report key performance and financial management measures to the Commerce Commission.

Watts said that the decision came after two reports released earlier this month highlighting poor financial management at the company.

The mayors of Wellington City, Hutt City, Upper Hutt, and Porirua are supportive of this decision. Anita Baker, mayor of Porirua mentioned "I hope it doesn't take too much of their time though to do it because at the moment we [councils] are all out consulting on our new water entity and for me its full steam ahead for the new water entity."

Cat Connor / Upper Hutt Libraries

Setting the scene in Upper Hutt: five questions with author Cat Connor

Ahead of Cat Connor launching [Indigo Romeo Lima] at our Central Library on 11 April 2025, we had the chance to get a glimpse behind the scenes.

In this interview, the creator of the acclaimed Byte series shares what inspires her new work and insights into what it takes to get from idea to published novel.

How did you come up with the idea for the Veronica Tracey series?

I wanted a protagonist who blended espionage and private investigation, which adds a unique twist to both genres.

Veronica "Ronnie" Tracey has a background in intelligence (ex-NZSIS) but now operates as a PI, which allows for a mix of high-stakes espionage and classic detective work. And I love a good supporting cast! Reynolds, Crockett, and Ronnie's mischievous Nana all add layers of intrigue, humour, and personal stakes.

There is definitely something delightful and delicious about writing a Kiwi set series. After writing the Byte series for so long, I was ready for a fresh setting and a new kind of protagonist. Plus, setting a spy/PI story in Upper Hutt adds a unique touch. Everyone knows nothing happens here.

(Note: This alludes to the first Veronica Tracey book, which is titled [Nothing Happens Here].)

Speaking of writing a series: what do you enjoy about reprising a character?

I really enjoy playing a long game, apparently. I don't know all there is to know about any of my characters when they first appear.

But, I also never intended to write any series, let alone two – three, if we count the Fates Entwined novella trilogy. Watching characters evolve is quite rewarding, and getting to know them in the process is fascinating to me.

For you, what's the most challenging part of the writing process?

It's not the writing; I can tell you that. I love the writing part.

First drafts are more challenging than editing and rewriting but the hardest thing about writing isn't even writing – it's marketing. I am currently 30K [words] into the next Veronica Tracey novel and very much enjoying it... And I don't want to stop writing to do other things, like marketing.

What advice do have for anyone who loves writing and might like to become a published author?

I will tell you what I tell my students when I teach crime writing: it's not enough to love writing; you have to be motivated. Love will get you so far but sheer determination is what it takes to finish a novel.

It's hard work and the rewards are slim so if you don't have enough determination and motivation to get those words written, it won't happen. Don't talk it to death – write the book!

And a classic library question to finish: can you give us a book recommendation of something you've recently enjoyed reading?

I just finished reading Assassin in a Blue Suit by Nick Spill. I love Nick's writing.

I was lucky enough to read an early copy and get to blurb for him. It's always slightly different when you read the final product! I've always been drawn to assassins, spies, and so forth.

The pointy end of police work

Police Commissioner Richard Chambers welcomed six new patrol dog teams after their graduation today at the Police Dog Training Centre at Trentham, Upper Hutt.

Alongside them also graduating were three personnel from 2nd Engineer Regiment, 2 Field Squadron Unit with three newly trained Explosive Detector Dogs (EDD).

The teams celebrated the occasion in front of whānau and friends, the Commissioner of Police with members of the police executive, and Lieutenant Colonel Joe Totoro Commanding Officer, 2nd Engineer Regiment, New Zealand Army.

Commissioner Chambers congratulated them all on their achievements.

"All our patrol dog teams play a crucial role in frontline policing, deploying to some of the most dynamic and challenging situations. We couldn't police the way we do without them.

"That's why I'm thrilled to see six newly trained dog teams graduate today. They will be welcomed into Eastern, Central, Waikato, Wellington, and Auckland police districts very soon."

Graduating from the police patrol dog course is one new and five experienced handlers with their dogs.

Wellington-bound Constable Nick Press with Police Dog 'Oskar' says, "It feels different this time around being my second operational dog after working 'Ink' for the past six years. It's exciting to get back on the street with a new young dog who is very different to 'Ink' and has taught me a lot and given me more skills as a handler."

Constable Pete Smits is heading back to the Waikato. "I got Ozark at the start of November last year, and I've enjoyed training him and getting him as ready as possible for the reality of what police delta teams do. I'd like to acknowledge the Waikato Dog Section for helping me get to this point in my career."

Laughter is good for you.

Imagine an opportunity to play as adults, to abandon reality, to be a little silly and take on some surprising challenges. Each week groups of over 65s are taking up the challenge and enjoying improvising and theatre games, and forging new friendships.

Social Drama for Seniors has returned to the Upper Hutt. Ten years ago a similar group called Unscripted ran a weekly session at the Upper Hutt Library, founded from a council community initiative. Meanwhile, Voice Arts began – a charitable trust providing access to dramabased creative programmes delivering social drama classes for seniors across Te Whanganui e Tara for the last 7 years, in community halls and in retirement villages.

After Unscripted finished up in Upper Hutt 5 years ago, many participants joined the Voice Arts sessions, travelling to Naenae's Rata Village for a weekly session. Social Drama is now running independently with classes in Upper Hutt, Naenae and Petone.

So what happens at Social Drama?

How: Each session is highly imaginative and different. It involves a series of improvisation exercises, story-telling and drama games. But no learning lines, reading from scripts or public performance. We are a supportive group and you participate at your own pace and nothing is compulsory. This is drama for the people!

Who: People over 65 with diverse life experiences, all walks of life, all abilities and with a sense of humour. The size of the group is between 10-20 people.

Sally Richards runs the group. She's an experienced facilitator, welcoming and wrangles the fun

Why: This is an innovative programme. It supports cognitive improvement, community connection, memory recall, and self-esteem. Laughter is very good for you. That's the science.

What people say:

"The social drama classes are an unparalleled opportunity for older folk to come together to rescue their brains, socialize and learn. The classes are confidence boosters and everyone is encouraged and applauded."

"There is always laughter and jokes, as well as care, courtesy, kindness and empathy. Sally models these behaviours and traits. Social Drama is a powerful contributor to building a strong and positive community."

The group's return to Upper Hutt Library is proving popular with new and returning faces. We are causing a little bit of a stir at the library! We hope that people will come along and see if this is for them.

Consultation on Upper Hutt City Council's Water Service Delivery Options – Local Water Done Well: Consultation closes 27th of April

Public consultation is now open on Upper Hutt City Council's Water Services Delivery Model Options under the Government's Local Water Done Well reform.

About this consultation

- The new legislation states that all councils must consult and decide on a delivery model and submit their water services delivery plan to Government by 3 September 2025.
- To read more about the process we've followed to reach this point, see the 'What's happened so far' section on our webpage: https://www.upperhutt.govt.nz/Home/Tabs/Council/Your-Council/Plans-policies-bylaws-and-reports/Local-Water-Done-Well-Reform
- Council is consulting with the community on this in accordance with the alternative requirements of the Local Government (Water Services Preliminary Arrangements) Act 2024 (sections 60-64). This means it is a little different to how other consultations may look, the information available and what we can do.
- There are only two options that we are asking for feedback on. You can read more about these options in the Consultation Document, and then provide feedback.
- Option 1 Our preferred approach: a new multi council owned water organisation which will own and operate public water, wastewater and stormwater assets/networks.
- Option 2 Modified status quo: a modified version of Wellington Water where asset ownership and investment decisions remain with each individual council. As the existing Wellington Water model would not comply with all aspects of the new legislation, this option includes changes required to comply with legislation.

We've done some initial financial work to compare different delivery models for your feedback. The financial details in the consultation document are not complete. The full financial information will be included in the final Water Services Delivery Plan.

We are teaming up with the councils (Hutt, Porirua and Wellington City Councils and Greater Wellington Regional Council) that would be part of the proposed new water services organisation to gather feedback on the preferred delivery approach. Following consultation, councillors will consider all the feedback and make their final decision on a new delivery model. Although each council will make its own decision, themes from feedback will be shared across all councils, to ensure alignment in the councils' decision-making.

- A water services delivery plan will then be finalised based on the confirmed delivery model. Councils are required to submit their plans to the Department of Internal Affairs no later than 3 September 2025 for review and approval.
- There is more detailed information available on a range of Frequently Asked Questions on the right of this page.

What's Local Water Done Well?

In December 2023 the Government announced a new direction for water services (drinking water, wastewater and stormwater) policy and legislation called Local Water Done Well (LWDW). It requires councils across the country to decide, alongside their communities, what approach they will take to deliver water services.

The Government's implementation map for the reform is available in the Supporting Documents section on the top right of this page.

The core expectations and legislative requirements of the reform are that:

- Councils develop a Water Services Delivery Plan to transition to a new water services delivery model that meets regulatory requirements (plans must be submitted to the Department of Internal Affairs by 3 September 2025 for review and approval).
- There will be increased regulation concerning water quality and infrastructure investment.
- Financial sustainability of a water service delivery model is required, based on sufficient revenue, ringfencing to fund investment and funding for growth.


FILM REVIEW

In the final days of the Second World War in Europe, Bonhoeffer is in prison following a failed assassination attempt on German leader, Adolf Hitler. The film then focuses on the events of his life which built up to this point, and shortly after his eventual hanging by Nazi soldiers.
