A reminder to clean up after your dog when it poops while out and about.

We've all seen it before — a steaming pile of dog poop on the pavement, in the park, or even in our own gardens. It's not a pleasant sight, and it's certainly not something we want to step in. But beyond being an eyesore, there are actually some very good reasons why you should always use a dog poo bag. We'll take a look at three of those reasons.

1. It's the law

In New Zealand, it is actually against the law to leave your dog's poos on public property. This includes pavements, parks, beaches, and any other areas where members of the public are likely to be walking or playing. If you're caught leaving your dog's poop behind, you could be fined up to \$150. So not only is it gross — it's also illegal!

2. It's Bad for Your Dog (and You!)

Leaving dog poo around can actually be dangerous for both dogs and humans. Dog poop can contain harmful bacteria that can cause gastrointestinal illnesses in both animals and people. So not only is picking up after your dog the courteous thing to do — it's also the best way to keep everyone healthy and safe.

3. It's good for the environment

When dog poop is left on the ground, it can eventually end up in our waterways — and that's not good news for the environment. Dog waste can pollute our water supplies and cause problems for local wildlife. Picking up your dog's poo and disposing of it properly is one small way you can help to protect the environment.

So there you have it — three good reasons why you should always use a dog poo bag. Next time you're out for a walk with your furry friend, remember to bring along some dog poo bags and pick up after them. It's good for your dog, good for you, and good for the planet.

Police Commissioner Richard Chambers congratulated five patrol handlers and their dogs and one detector dog team at the Dog Training Centre (DTC) in Trentham yesterday. (Thursday 29th of May)

The teams graduated and paraded out in number one uniforms and shiny shoes in front of whānau, friends and work colleagues alongside executives from the New Zealand Police.

Commissioner Chambers congratulated the newly trained dog teams, saying they would offer a valuable service on the front line.

"It is fantastic to see these six dog teams graduate today and head back out to districts. They will have an exciting career – our dog teams regularly deploy in tough situations and are remarkable at what they do."

He also thanked the DTC staff. "You continue to produce the best handlers and teams that our organisation and country could hope for."

Christchurch, Hawke's Bay, Timaru, and Auckland welcome the new frontline patrol dogs and Wellington District acquires the new explosives detector dog.

Inspector Todd Southall, National Coordinator Police Dogs, says "Congratulations to all our graduating dog handlers.

"These frontline patrol dogs are incredible and work alongside our officers doing some of the most dangerous jobs in police.

Our amazing detector dogs are trained to detect drugs, firearms, cash, and explosives. Both our front line and detector dogs are worth their weight in gold.

Local Elections 2025 / NGĀ PŌTI Ā-ROHE 2025

Mark your calendar – the next local election opens on Tuesday, 9 September and closes on Saturday, 11 October 2025.

Our local elections are held every three years and this year's VOTE 2025 will give you the chance to vote for local and regional council members, as well as members to represent Upper Hutt in Hutt Mana Charitable Trust and Rimutaka Licensing Trust.

Whether you're looking for details on candidates, voting bin locations, or key dates, you'll find everything you need here to participate in shaping the future of our community.

Voting opens from Tuesday, 9 September and closes at 12 noon on Saturday, 11 October 2025.

Update your details to receive voting papers:

In order for you to receive your voting papers in the post between 9 September and 22 September, you must enrol to vote. Now is the time to check if you are already enrolled and whether your postal details are correct. Click the link and follow the instructions: https://vote.nz/enrolling/enrol-or-update/enrol-or-update-online

Who can vote?

You can enrol to vote if you:

- are 18 years or older; and
- are a New Zealand Citizen or Permanent Resident; or
- have lived in New Zealand continuously for 12 months or more at some time in your life.

If you're enrolled to vote for the parliamentary elections, you're automatically enrolled for local elections too.

If you're enrolled to vote, you should receive your voting papers in the mail between Tuesday, 9 September and Monday, 22 September 2025.

Wherever you pay rates, you can vote

Here's a little something you may not know.

If you live elsewhere in New Zealand but own property in Upper Hutt , you may be able to enrol as a non-resident ratepayer elector and vote in both areas. What to do with voting papers

Once you have completed your voting papers, you can either drop them off in the secured voting bin around Upper Hutt, or freepost them using the prepaid envelope provided.

If you are posting them, check your envelope for the postal cut-off date.

More information to come about the location of the secured voting bins.

KA PĒWHEA AU E TŪ HAI KAITONO? / HOW DO I RUN AS A CANDIDATE?

Now is also the time to consider if you would like to run as a candidate for the upcoming local election.

Candidate nominations are open from 4 July and closes on 1 August at 12 noon.

How do I know if I'm eligible?

To be eligible to stand as a candidate, you must meet the following requirements. You must:

- · be 18 years and above;
- be enrolled as a voter anywhere in New Zealand; and
- be a New Zealand Citizen.

You do not need to be a resident of the district(s) you choose to run but your two nominees must.

If you or your partner hold a contract of more than \$25,000 for the local council, you cannot stand unless you have prior approval from the Auditor-General.

How do I submit my nominations?

You will need:

- to complete an official nomination form sent to Council's electoral officials either electronically or in person before 12pm on Friday, 1 August 2025
- to include in your submission a passport sized photo and a 150-word candidate profile.
- to include nominations from two residents of Upper Hutt. You cannot nominate yourself, and those who nominate candidates must be over 18 years old and enrolled to vote in Upper Hutt.
- to give your consent for their nominations.
- to pay a \$200 deposit, which may be refunded depending on election results.

Your submission must be dropped off in person or emailed to our Election Officer before 12 noon on Friday, 1 August 2025.

Porirua City Council is including a nonbinding referendum at this year's local election regarding the amalgamation of Wellington's councils, and Hutt City Council is considering the same. What is Upper Hutt's opinion on this?

Porirua City Council agreed to ask the question from their communities in a meeting on the 29th of May - the reason being as they were already including a Māori ward referendum anyway. Lower Hutt Mayor, Campbell Barry said he would bring a decision on whether to add a non-binding referendum question to the local election ballot at a council meeting next month.

The text will read. "Should Hutt City Council work with councils in Wellington, Upper Hutt, Porirua and the Wellington Regional Council to explore the possibility of creating one single council, that combines relevant services and functions regionally, while keeping appropriate local services and decision making local?"

Daniel Talbot who runs Recycling for Charity is currently looking for donations of old and obsolete tech from companies, government agencies, and the general public.



There's a feral cat-shaped hole in the Predator Free target species list

Predator Free New Zealand is wanting to know your opinions on whether feral cats should be added to the Predator Free 2050 target species list.

Feral cats are present in all areas of New Zealand and can adapt to any environment, from the coast to up in the mountains, feral cats can be found. Unlike our domesticated cats, feral cats will hunt anything they can in order to survive, these include any and all birds (native or introduced alike), lizards, bats, even seabirds. Unlike what you might think, feral cats aren't great at keeping down the rodent numbers. Rodents are by nature prey animals, fast moving, fast breeding, and cautious. Our native wildlife on the other hand never really had much in the way of predators, so it was never in their genes to be prepared for the danger feral cats pose to them.

Waste to Worth: Good Carbon Farm Expands for a Greener Future

In 2023, The Good Carbon Farm captured local attention with its innovative sustainability project in Upper Hutt, funded in part by the Sustainable Stimulus Grant (SSG). Today, that initiative is gaining momentum, turning forestry waste into climate-positive solutions and laying the groundwork for long-term environmental impact.

Despite its modest size, the initiative punched above its weight. It drew interest from media, forestry professionals, and school-based food and gardening programs, and contributed content to the Sustainable Landscape Guide developed by fellow SSG recipient Urban Edge Planning.

Last year's SSG-funded project saw over 3 tonnes of forestry slash converted into biochar in the Akatārawa Valley, storing roughly 50% of the carbon that would have been re-emitted through natural decomposition. The biochar was then incorporated into local school and community gardens, creating micro carbon sinks, and triggering a reaction that makes soil more resilient. The core of the project centres around carbon storage. Using a controlled process, forestry waste is baked into solid form that creates biochar – capturing carbon dioxide that would have otherwise returned to the atmosphere.

The project has also enabled a major step forward for Gallops Ridge—investment in new production infrastructure now in operation, securing the ability to produce biochar in the Akatārawa Valley well into the future.

"This initiative aligns closely with our Sustainability Strategy," said Tim Harty, Group Manager Operations at Upper Hutt City Council. "It supports our goals around reducing emissions, building resilient communities, minimising waste, promoting education, and demonstrating leadership."

The project didn't stop in Upper Hutt. In April 2024 a similar initiative funded by the Mazda Foundation launched in Auckland, further showcasing the potential of community-scale biochar to tackle climate and food security issues.

Now, in 2025, The Good Carbon Farm is taking another bold step with the launch of The Good Carbon Store—an online platform allowing individuals to mitigate climate change through the gift of carbon storage. This new initiative aims to create a self-sustaining financial model for the charity, while celebrating its supporters through online acknowledgements and an interactive map.

The Store's revenue is expected to support three key initiatives in Upper Hutt over the next three years:

- Scaling up biochar production in the Akatārawa Valley
- Continuing supply to school and community gardens
- Building and deploying mobile biochar-making equipment across the region

The Good Carbon Farm has also cultivated strong collaborations with Enviroschools, Garden to Table, Oke and other sustainability networks. Their journey-from grassroots innovation to scalable climate solution—is being shared through podcasts and public engagement efforts.

As biochar continues to demonstrate its power as a natural, circular, and regenerative technology, The Good Carbon Farm is proving that even small-scale projects can sow the seeds of big change.

BEST advocacy for beneficiaries and low-income earners – Government has created a perfect storm – Teresa Homan

As the service manager of BEST advocacy service for beneficiaries and low-income earners, for 22 plus years, I am concerned in the rising stress levels of our most vulnerable members of society. Those out of work, the sick, mentally unwell, those with addictions and the elderly. Their hand to mouth benefit income combined with limited access to doctors, mental health and addiction services is creating growing frustration and growing anger. This along with the latest benefit traffic light sanctions on people out of work, often unwell or living with an addiction, required to seek employment in non-existent jobs or jobs where they are no better off and open to exploitation through 90-day work trials. Then there is the restricting of emergency housing to the homeless who are sent away from work and income offices to find temporary transitional housing and in the meantime left to sleep in cars, our parks and public amenities. Now 18-year-old independent adults, not in work or training, are required to provide their parents income when applying for assistance. Those whose parent's income are at, a yet to be disclosed amount, will need to hope their parents will continue to provide for them, adding stress to the family dynamics. We are creating a perfect storm which will break, if we the voters, don't call a halt to the current governments war on the poor and most vulnerable in our communities. Our service, like most service organisation I'm sure, are dealing with at risk people in greater numbers than we have before. They come to us frustrated, frightened, angry and we do our best to assist them but often our hands are tied or the help we can give takes time to achieve leaving them literally at times out in the cold. It is becoming a risk for service providers in terms of staff safety as I am sure it is for those working at the coal face implementing the governments "get tough on beneficiaries" legislation. If the storm that is brewing is not dissipated, we will, I believe see consequences we didn't envisage but we will all be responsible for not calling a halt to the unjustified attack on out vulnerable, homeless community members.



AT HOME: Household hints and tips

Can't wear Converse etc because of flat feet? Here's how to insert your own insoles

Coming from one who has flat feet/fallen arches themselves, it's only been recently that I've been able to expand my range of footwear when coming across this simple little technique. The only extra bit of equipment you need besides your sneakers, and your insoles, is a hairdryer.

The insoles inside most pairs of Converse and Vans, and other similar sneakers are secured with glue. Using the direct heat from a hairdryer, have it on the lowest heat setting, and apply the heat directly to the insole, probably giving about 10-20 seconds on each section. By now, you should be able to begin gently lifting the insoles up out of the sneakers. If they haven't become loose enough to remove, then repeat the process.

Once the insole is removed, give the sneakers time to cool down again to room temperature, I give it overnight to make sure the glue has dried completely again, and is no longer sticky. You can now put your insoles in your new sneakers and have them the right fit for your feet. I've made very thin liners for the insoles out of grease-proof paper for ease of removing the insoles in and out, but this isn't an essential thing.

Notes

- The above procedure may not be necessary, even if you do have flat feet / fallen arches, as I've recently noticed. Wear your new sneakers for a good while, go for a walk in them. If your feet feel fine, and the sneakers aren't causing them discomfort, then keep them the way they are.
- I don't recommend using this process with slip-ons as you really need to have open access to the entire shoe, to properly remove the entire insole. I speak from experience when it comes to this. Attempt this only with lace ups.
