Buller Declaration Offers Upper Hutt Residents a Chance to Join the Fight for Better Health Services.

Upper Hutt, 6th July 2025 – Following the powerful protest march in Westport on 28 September 2024, where 2,000 passionate individuals gathered to voice concerns over inadequate health services in the West Coast Region, the Buller Declaration is now available for Upper Hutt residents to sign.

The declaration will be available for signing at specific locations in Upper Hutt:

- Sunday, 6th July at Brewtown Farmers Market from 8.30 am – 1.00 pm
- Saturday, 12th July 2025 at 118 Main Street, Upper Hutt from 9.30 am – 4.00 pm (Thanks to All Things Property for supporting this initiative).

Why the Buller Declaration Matters: This significant initiative, spearheaded by Dr Malcolm Mulholland (cofounder of Patient Voice Aotearoa) and the Buller Health Action Group, aims to tackle critical issues affecting healthcare access and quality across our communities.

The Westport march highlighted distressing grievances, including:

- · Buller Hospital's closure for nearly a month.
- Only one ambulance serving the entire region.
- Adverse weather preventing the sole air rescue helicopter from operating.
- Closure of all urgent and after-hours clinics, pushing residents towards telehealth services and leaving many without essential care.

The Buller Declaration was officially signed at the Westport Clock Tower by prominent healthcare advocates, including Dr Malcolm Mulholland (Patient Voice Aotearoa), Anita Halsall-Quinlan (Buller Health Action Group), Kerri Nuku (New Zealand Nurses Organisation), Andrew Laurenson (Royal New Zealand College of General Practitioners), Sarah Dalton (Association of Salaried Medical Specialists), and Jeremy Webber (Hauora Taiwhenua Rural Health Network). Their collective voices call all New Zealanders to stand up for their right to quality healthcare.

Upper Hutt residents are strongly encouraged to participate in this vital movement by signing the Buller Declaration, signifying a unified demand for improved healthcare services not only in Buller but across New Zealand. This is a crucial opportunity for the community to show solidarity with those affected by recent healthcare service disruptions and advocate for necessary changes.

"We invite every resident of Upper Hutt to join us in making their voices heard," says Hellen Swales, Deputy Mayor for Upper Hutt. "By signing the Buller Declaration, you play a crucial role in advocating for the right of every New Zealander to access quality healthcare services, no matter their location."

Residents will have the chance to learn more about the issues at hand and how they can contribute to ongoing efforts for better health services by speaking to Hellen Swales, Deputy Mayor for Upper Hutt, who will attend both sessions on the 6th and 12th July.

Council confirms its Annual Plan and water services delivery model

Upper Hutt City Council has formally adopted its Annual Plan for 2025/2026, following community consultation held from 24 March to 27 April.

The plan outlines key priorities for the year ahead and reflects Council's continued focus on core activities and service delivery.

This year, we informed our community about the Annual Plan 2025/2026 average rates increase of 15.78% being lower than the Long Term Plan forecast, and consulted on options for kerbside recycling.

Other concurrent consultation topics included Fees and Charges, a new the Alcohol Fees Bylaw, and changes to the Revenue and Financing Policy and the Gambling Venues Policy.

Mayor Wayne Guppy acknowledged and thanked the community for feedback during the consultation period.

"Council's decisions reflect a careful balance between community needs, fiscal responsibility, and our commitment to delivering essential infrastructure and services," he says.

"We appreciate the feedback received from our community, as this has been valuable in helping to shape our decisions."

Council also confirmed its future model to deliver water services as a new multi-council-owned water organisation, planned to be established with Hutt, Wellington, and Porirua City Councils and Greater Wellington Regional Council.

"Based on the options and requirements in the Local Water Done Well legislation, the best way forward is to pool our resources and tackle significant water infrastructure issues together," says Mayor Guppy.

"The aim is to now develop a joint water service delivery plan that is workable, financially sustainable, and meets the needs of communities and the environment."

Key decisions and what they mean

Local Water Done Well

Council confirmed its water service delivery model as per the consultation's preferred option for a new multi-council-owned water organisation (planned to be established with Hutt, Wellington and Porirua City Councils and Greater Wellington Regional Council) which will own and operate public water supply, wastewater, and stormwater assets and networks

Subsequent to this decision, a water services delivery plan will be developed for Council adoption on 20 August 2025, before its submission to the Department of Internal Affairs.

Kerbside Recycling Activity - Option 2

What is it?

Council currently operates a recycling drop-off facility on Park Street, but space and capacity issues limit its effectiveness. Kerbside recycling is currently privately arranged. A previously planned Council-run kerbside service was included in the Long Term Plan 2024–2034, in line with a now-repealed Government mandate. As this mandate was removed by the Government, Council sought feedback on whether to continue with these plans.

Council's decision

Adopted Option 2: Retain enhanced status quo and investigate additional recycling locations.

Why this matters

Responds to public support for accessible, Councilled recycling and addresses capacity issues at Park Street.

Class 4 Gambling Venues Policy - Option 2

What is it?

This policy regulates the number and location of venues with pokie machines in Upper Hutt. It currently caps machines at 174 and limits venues to Business Commercial Zones. There are also restrictions near sensitive sites such as schools, childcare centres, Kōhanga Reo, and community facilities.

Council's decision

Adopted Option 2: Removes "or other community facilities" as a restricted location.

Why this matters

Reduces restrictions on where new gambling venues can open, streamlining policy while maintaining protections for key sensitive areas.

Alcohol Fees Bylaw - Option 2

What is it?

This bylaw introduces fees for alcohol licensing activities, enabling the Council to recover 80% of the associated administrative and enforcement costs. Fees vary based on the risk profile of the licensed premises and include application, annual, and special license charges.

Council's decision

Adopted Option 2: Implement the bylaw with fees phased in over three years.

Why this matters

Ensures costs are met by the alcohol industry rather than ratepayers, promoting a fairer funding approach.

Revenue and Financing Policy - Option 1

What is it?

This policy outlines how Council services are funded – through rates, user charges, grants, and other income, and includes rating differentials to balance cost distribution across property types.

Council's decision

Adopted: Update the existing policy to reflect greater fairness and clarity.

Why this matters

Promotes transparency and aligns funding methods with public expectations of equity.

Schedule of Fees and Charges - Option 1

What is it?

A standard update of fees for Council services. This year's schedule also includes clarification of the age range for "child rates at H2O Xtream" and compassionate fee waivers for cemetery plots.

Council's decision

Adopted Option 1: Confirmed child definition as ages 5-15 at H2O Xtream, and waived cemetery plot fees for stillborn babies and children aged under one.

Why this matters

Supports fairness in public service pricing and provides compassionate relief for grieving families

Off the leash: After 50 years in Police – 45 of them in Dog Section – this week Sergeant Al Campbell is hanging up the leash

Sergeant Alan Campbell has served more than 300 years on Dog Section. Dog years, that is, but even in human years it's a decent length of time.

Al joined Police on 12 May 1975 at the age of 20 and has spent 45 of the past 50 years with Dog Section.

He is finally retiring after 50 years of "amazing, rewarding and satisfying experiences".

Al spent 16 years working with patrol dogs and another 16 working with detector dogs in Wellington. For the past 13 years, he has been a trainer at the Dog Training Centre (DTC) at Trentham.

Al graduated as a fresh faced 'newbie' in a black uniform and started duty on 14 August 1975.

He spent a few years patrolling the streets of Porirua, doing the usual callouts to family harm, thefts, assaults, pub fights, disorder jobs and sudden deaths.

In 1979, the then 23-year-old Al was deployed to one of the most intense operations – Operation Overdue, the investigation into the crash of Flight TE901 on Mt Erebus, Antarctica.

He was drafted on to the mortuary phase of the operation – identifying victims, liaising with families, and repatriating remains. He worked Auckland along with 119 other Police staff and told his then-fiancée Chris he may not be home for Christmas.

Many staff, like AI, had undertaken DVI training, and some had been on standby for the ice recovery phase.

He had a longstanding interest in aviation, with 200-plus flying hours, and had read many air accident reports – but when the call came, it was for the mortuary phase. "At that point I had no idea what was going to happen or how long it would take".

The DVI processes were new and relatively untested. "We were making up the rules as we went basically, evolving and streamlining what we had."

The phase successfully identified 214 of the 257 people on the aircraft and returned them to their families.

Al remembers many significant jobs from his frontline time, but none quite the lasting impact as Operation Overdue.

Other than Operation Overdue, Al took part in many notable policing events.

He policed the Wellington parts of the Springbok Tour while on Dog Section. "Pete Hayes and I just had young untrained pups at that point so weren't deployed throughout the country.

"We stayed in Wellington and helped on the days (Wednesdays and Saturdays) without dogs, just as frontline officers."

Another significant task was around 10 years working as a spotter on the cannabis recovery operations.

"It involved flying about in a light aircraft and later a chopper. Even though I'd spent a lot of my spare time around aircraft and the aviation industry, I used to get violently ill with the low-level flying.

There was plenty of variety in policing, but what took his fancy was working with dogs.

Dog handlers in those days had to be married, which was taken to mean a stable home life. Less than a year after Operation Overdue ended, Al and Chris married. Within a week of the wedding Al had submitted his application for Dog Section.

Al joined Dog Section on 20 November 1980 and graduated on his birthday – 11 March 1982 – with his first dog, Pacer.

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Over 16 years he worked with four patrol dogs – German shepherds Pacer, Champ, Kia and Max.

"Back then, as a junior handler at the start of your career, it was quite hierarchical," he says. "When you were asked to do something by your senior colleagues or sergeant, you just did it.

"I got called by a senior handler to pick him up one night late from the Cook Strait ferry. I went down in my dog van – which is only two-seater due to the dog box in the back

"Unbeknownst to me the handler and his wife, who were foot-passengers, got off the ferry with a goat purchased in the South Island and brought back to keep the grass down on a plot of land in Wellington.

Al's favourite dog was Kia, a black German shepherd who was brilliant at tracking. "He was an amazing police dog and really boosted my confidence."

Kia and AI still hold the record for the highest number of catches in a week of night shifts – 13 operational successes and 42 offenders caught at a time when frontline staff worked seven nights in a row.

After 16 years, Al became a detector dog handler with a Labrador called Floyd, inherited from retiring handler Peter Hill in the 1990s.

Then came a curly coat retriever called Gus, Daniel the spaniel, another lab Emma, and German shepherd Jay – "an awesome little dog".

Despite initially missing the adrenaline rush of patrol dogs, Al found but they could still get their share of excitement.

"Back in the day, as detector dog handlers we didn't often wait for the Armed Offenders Squad (AOS) as backup at search warrants. We'd be there for the breach and, being first in, we'd come across more firearms and drugs and so on."

He never saw himself being promoted or taking an instructor's role, but when the opportunity came up at the DTC, he took it. "I'd found my niche."

A second Floyd, fostered, trained and worked by Al, became a champion for Sergeant Chris 'Harry' Harris in the 2000s, taking top honours for narcotic detector dogs at the Police National Championships twice, and the Australasian Championships once. Harry attributes the success largely to Al and the big influence he had.

Al trained and fostered eight dogs deployed to Pacific Islands as well as throughout New Zealand. Most recently he trained Spy, who graduated and deployed to New Caledonia with his handler last month.

Al worked in the Pacific – mostly Fiji and Samoa – every four months. Although he loved it, spending up to 10 weeks a year overseas was a big ask with family and other commitments at home.

He rates Eto, who was deployed to Fiji, as the most successful of his trainees.

Al kept all his dogs as family pets after they retired. It must have made an impression on the family because it inspired his son Rob to join Police and Dog Section.

Al's motivation to stick with the same job for so long is the same as for most dog handlers. "It's a great job with a great partner."

"It's quite a challenge when you start training dogs. Firstly, they are young, new, and learning, and you're repeating tasks. Then they grow and get better and transition to operational work.

"It's initially hard, then it gets easier and enjoyable as the dog knows what to do and does it well. Then later, when they're older, they start slowing down – that's when you start looking for a new dog. It's a cycle."

The 50 years have flown by, he says.

"I've thoroughly enjoyed the challenges Dog Section and the Dog Training Centre offered me. I'm very proud of the reputation our New Zealand Police Dog Section has on an international scale."

Fishing and motorbikes are on the horizon for retirement: "I'm sorting out a bigger boat. I'm not one to sit back and relax."

Update on the Logan Street pipe renewal

Kia ora Upper Hutt,

Works to install new drinking and wastewater pipes along Logan Street are well underway! This will mean more resilient and reliable pipes for Logan Street, reducing the need for unexpected repairs and disruptions that come with that.

Crews are working hard, sometimes in the early hours of 3 am to minimise disruption for local services and businesses.

When crews reach the Queen St roundabout by around mid-July, the roundabout will be partially closed for around four days to allow crews to safely connect the new wastewater pipe to the network. After that, we'll finish connecting Logan Street homes to the new wastewater pipe.

Signage and traffic management crews will help guide traffic

Key things to keep in mind:

- · We expect to complete the project by August.
- We expect to finish up where Sinclair St meets Logan Street in about a week, with traffic management removed.
- We're not anticipating a need for any more temporary drinking water shutdowns.
- Parking is available again opposite the Cossie Club (in front of the Toy Library).

Using SH2 during the school holidays? Good news – Your commute won't be affected by the Silverstream Pipebridge project!

Heading north on SH2 over the school holidays?

Great news – your commute won't be impacted as the connecting works on Whakawhirinaki, the Silverstream pipe bridge will not be underway yet.

We need to do a bit more prep work on the pipe bridge before connecting it to the drinking water network. We'll provide an update on timing as soon as possible.

In the meantime, prep works on Fergusson Drive are progressing well! To date the installation of an access manhole and thrust block are almost complete. An access manhole would make underground pipe maintenance easier, while a thrust block is a concrete support that holds the pipe in place under pressure or movements.

Depending on weather conditions, we expect traffic management to be removed temporarily early July until the cut-in works take place.

Stay tuned for further updates on the project.

Wellington Water to be replaced by new stand-alone entity next year

Wellington's troubled water services provider will be replaced with a new stand-alone entity by this time next year, which councils say will be less costly for ratepayers.

Upper Hutt City Council agreed yesterday to back the "reset", which already had the support of Porirua, Lower Hutt and Wellington City Councils and Greater Wellington Regional Council.

Lower Hutt mayor Campbell Barry, who chairs the Wellington Water Committee, welcomed today's "milestone", saying the decision marked "a reset for water services in the region".

Unlike Wellington Water, the new entity would own the water infrastructure that was currently owned by councils, which meant it would be able to generate its own income, manage its own debt, and "not be constrained by council funding".

"The new entity unlocks the financial tools needed to make smart investments in water infrastructure, without placing an unsustainable burden on ratepayers.

"It will enable better decision-making across the entire network and ensure more consistent service delivery.'

Turning around "historical underinvestment" in water infrastructure would take time and water bills would still increase under the new entity to meet the needs of the region's ageing network, he admitted.

However, high-level modelling showed that any rise in water charges would be about 30 percent less than what households would face under the current model.

"Our main goal is to introduce a new way of delivering water services that allows for more investment in the network with an entity that is more efficient; while keeping costs more affordable and sustainable over the long-term," Barry said.

The entity will be governed by a board of independent professional directors who will be appointed by a steering committee of council and iwi representatives.

The decision comes as part of the government's Local Water Done Well reform, which requires councils to decide on a long term water services model and submit delivery plans by September 2025.

The new entity will take over the ownership and management of drinking water, wastewater and stormwater infrastructure by 1 July 2026.

Crime in Upper Hutt – Hellen Swales, Deputy Mayor

Over the last week, several concerning break-ins have occurred at local businesses in Upper Hutt. We know the community feels unsafe due to home invasions, car break-ins, stolen cars, homelessness, and retail crime. This is a real concern for these businesses, our community, and myself. Our council representatives are meeting with the Police Area Commander on Wednesday 2nd July 2025, and I will raise these issues. The question for him is how he plans to address the recent increases in crime across most categories.

Last week, an Upper Hutt Police Community Constable attended the monthly Grey Power Meeting, which I also attended. This discussion focused on self-protection and detection of scams for Grey Power members.

Area Commander Wade Jennings also attended the Upper Hutt Multicultural Council meeting a week ago, where I was present as the Deputy Mayor of Upper Hutt. The discussions with the Area Commander centered on retail crime and general crime statistics for Upper Hutt. He commented on the rise in social issues as one of the common drivers.

The Hutt Valley Chamber of Commerce hosted a meeting last week on retail crime, attended by Sunny Kaushal, Chairman of the Ministerial Advisory Group on Retail Crime at the Ministry of Justice, Area Commander Wade Jennings, and myself as Upper Hutt's Deputy Mayor. The agenda included:

- Recent and upcoming legislative changes impacting retailers
- Open discussion on challenges faced by large and small retail businesses
- Sharing concerns directly with Ministry of Justice representatives
- Collaborating on solutions to make communities and businesses safer

A number of Upper Hutt retailers attended the Chamber event. An Upper Hutt council officer shared that our Upper Hutt retailers have an advanced network among themselves and direct access to the police through this network. While the council can't provide a large network of cameras, I believe that through the cooperation of businesses and the public, they have good coverage of the Central Business District. However, in light of recent events, the retailer and camera networks may need reviewing—a point for discussion next week with the Area Commander.

If anyone has concerns or views they would like raised with the Area Commander, please send them to hellen.swales@uhcc.govt.nz, and I will include them in our discussions. We look forward to further discussions with Wade and our elected members next Wednesday, 2nd July.

The RMA has guttered local councils' ability to regulate buildings and manage local environmental concerns by taking over control of these regulations and consents. Central government seeks to increase this control by reducing or eliminating regional councils. Beware of ACT candidates running for council wanting even greater control with their Regulatory standards Bill. In all this the losers will be us the local people and local democracy we will lose all input or influence on local issues due to no council to speak or set regulations on our behalf. We can all focus on rates and think that we will somehow reduce what services cost us by economics of scale. I think this is a false dream destined to turn into a nightmare if we don't protect our right to participate in managing those things that matter to us by strong independent local government .I believe we need to start by calling for all rate payers to be shareholders as of right in our combined water entity and to vote in coming local election for people who believe in local democracy and tell us the truth about our budget requirements to deliver public services rather than telling us they can keep rates down.
