# Lane width reductions and alternate routes while Whakawhirinaki / The Silversream pipe bridge is connected to the region's drinking water network.

It's on! Works to connect Whakawhirinaki, the Silverstream pipe bridge, to the drinking water network is starting mid-September. This is a major step towards increasing our region's water supply resilience!

As works will be taking place next to SH2 and Fergusson Drive, there will be some traffic impacts during the works.

Lane diversions will be in place around the Fergusson Drive (south)/Silverstream Bridge intersection from 7 September until early November.

Traffic management on SH2 at Silverstream is expected to be between14 September and early October.

Two northbound lanes towards Upper Hutt will remain open, but the lane widths will be reduced to 2.8m.

### Upper Hutt CBD – Revitalisation | Hellen Swales

### Introduction

I'm acutely aware that Upper Hutt's Central Business District (CBD) has been a concern for many in our community for some time and has been a consistent theme in the Upper Hutt Councils Annual Community survey.

At the Council meeting on 30 October 2024, I asked officers whether we have a strategy in place to address areas where we are not meeting community expectations or satisfaction in the delivery of services. Too often, we survey the community but see very little change as a result. I will be following up when the next survey results come to the Council table to see whether the dial has shifted and whether we are making genuine progress with regards to the CBD.

I believe, council and community, know there are issues with absentee building owners and a noticeable deterioration in the CBD's presentation.

As a council, the options to directly address this are limited, but the challenge remains: how do we encourage building owners to tenant their premises rather than leave them empty? This is a conversation that has been had around the Upper Hutt City Council table, and it's one which needs to remain on our agenda, not just talked about but also actioned.

Gisborne District Council submitted to the Annual Conference of Local Government New Zealand calling for "tackling unoccupied buildings as a priority" and for legislative change to give councils the power to take action. Upper Hutt City Council supported the remit(proposal) from the Gisborne District Council. Since supporting this council have also been investigating the possibility of introducing its own updated bylaw. In my opinion, the current tools are not sufficient to achieve positive outcomes in addressing derelict and unoccupied commercial buildings.

This Upper Hutt bylaw has references to the Local Government Act 2002 which also, in my opinion, is ineffective in supporting a positive outcome for council and our city.

### The Challenge

Upper Hutt is not alone in facing this issue, Whanganui, South Wairarapa, and Gisborne, to name just a few, all feel they are equally ineffective in achieving better outcomes for their cities. Many are all well aware of the consequences of these unoccupied buildings:

- Unoccupied or deteriorating buildings negatively affect local economies and tourism in key centres, undermining the key roles councils play in attracting new businesses and visitors to their communities.
- That unoccupied buildings can result in increased vandalism and antisocial behaviour, including litter and sanitation issues.

With a proposed rates review on the agenda for Upper Hutt City Council, this is an ideal opportunity to put on the table a conversation about introducing a Business Improvement District (BID) programme or a MainStreet programme. There are many proven examples across New Zealand of how these initiatives have successfully revitalised CBD and boosted economic activity.

In Auckland there are currently 51 BIDs, representing over 25,000 businesses with a combined capital value estimated at \$72.7 billion. Through the Business Improvement District (BID) programme, Auckland Council works with business districts to improve the local business environment and grow the regional economy. This programme creates a relationship between the council and business associations, which are separate entities.

Mainstreet Programmes have a similar brief to BIDs in that they too are independent of council and are funded through a targeted rate on building owners.

The first Mainstreet program was in Wanganui which started in a time when things were on the decline for them in 1991.

- We were established in 1991, a time when Whanganui's CBD had grown increasingly tired and was in serious economic decline. 30 years on, the economic outlook has vastly improved, and perceptions of our city have changed significantly – with Whanganui regularly topping the list as New Zealand's most beautiful city.
- Mainstreet Whanganui is a not-for-profit town centre management organisation representing the Whanganui CBD. We work to promote local businesses and make our central city as vibrant and attractive as possible.
- From our outset, Mainstreet has been a catalyst for change in Whanganui, both as an advocacy group supporting local businesses, and as a grassroots organisation, carrying out beautification works and managing events in the central city.

For Upper Hutt, I would take the opportunity to have this conversation to establish a BID or a Mainstreet programme as part of the rates review. These initiatives must be led by the business community, not imposed from the top down.

Upper Hutt had a similar programme back in the early 2000's called Experience Upper Hutt. Unfortunately, council stopped it in 2012 even though it had the approval of local businesses.

I'm not prepared to spend more ratepayer money on consultants for CBD design. Over the years, we've already had reports from at least three — Hames Sharley, Kobus Mentz, and Isthmus. The last thing we need is yet another report provided from external consultants, when Upper Hutt is more than capable of telling its own story and shaping its own future.

I see council's role is to provide, in partnership with local Building and Business Owners:

- Infrastructure & Placemaking:
   Streetscapes, lighting, signage, parking, parks the things businesses can't build themselves but need to attract customers.
- Events & Activations: Markets, festivals, and seasonal promotions that bring people into commercial areas.
- Business-friendly Policy: Streamlined consenting, reduced red tape, and clear communication.
- Promotion & Marketing: Destination branding for the town or CBD, often run in partnership with a business association.

The heart of our city should be vibrant, welcoming, and full of life. This is a theme of conversations I have heard from many in our city.

This isn't just about physical improvements, it's about changing the story of the CBD from "a bit quiet" to "the place to be in Upper Hutt.", a destination to spend time in.

These ideas would need the support of building owners and business in order to drive any framework in revitalising our CBD. The council can support either a BID, or Mainstreet programme, that provides the opportunity for building and business owners to work with the council. Such an approach would encourage collaboration to achieve greater local outcomes.

I see this as a unique relationship where communication and professional cooperation are valued.

### How I believe this could be approached.

With a realistic, budget-conscious approach to shift perception of the Upper Hutt CBD and build momentum over time. Purse strings are tight, both for council, business owners, building owners and community, but I believe the following could be achieved.

#### 1. Quick Wins (0-12 months) Fast Visible Changes

- Pop-up activation: Encourage short-term leases for pop-up shops, art displays, or community uses in vacant spaces (low rent incentives with landlords). Our community has amazing talent from all throughout our community, engaging ideas using local talents.
- CBD events calendar: Run regular, small-scale events e.g., night markets, food truck events, live street music that give people a reason to come after hours.
- Beautification blitz: Budget-friendly improvements like better lighting, flower planters, and repainting tired façades in partnership with building owners.

### 2. Medium-Term (1-3 years) Growing Together

- Anchor attraction: Support one or two standout businesses or experiences (e.g. destination dining, artisan market) that make the CBD a drawcard and as a springboard for all of our local businesses
- Public space upgrade: Redesign key areas like pedestrian alleys or squares to make them more inviting, safer and people friendly.
- Business mix strategy: Partner with building and business owners to target missing services, like more hospitality, specialty retail, or entertainment venues.
- Parking Accessibility: Encouraging a parking review with the support of the community along with building and business owners.
- Local and Regional Promotion: In collaboration with Upper Hutt Council, promoting Upper Hutt as a Vibrant destination for shopping and Vibe.

### 3. Long-Term (3-5 years) Changing the Story

- Consistent branding: Promote the CBD as the "Heart of Upper Hutt" with coordinated signage, marketing, and events.
- Mixed-use development: Encourage upper-floor residential living to bring more people into the CBD day and night.
- Transport and access improvements: Make it easier to get into and around the CBD for all.

 Extended Promotion: Expanded promotion of Upper Hutt outside of the Wellington region.

### In Summary

This approach uses low-cost, partnership-driven initiatives to build visible improvement quickly, while laying the groundwork for bigger changes. Every initiative keeps momentum going, so perception shifts from "tired and empty" to "alive and worth visiting" and puts the direction and pace back in the hands of those who know our CBD best.

Upper Hutt Council simply do not have the budget at present to take on new projects. Instead, we must encourage out-of-the-box thinking and build partnerships that deliver real wins for our community.

### Your thoughts:

Many of these ideas are grandiose. A big hurdle in any revitalisation of the CBD is the Mall owner who owns many of the CBD buildings.

Upper Hutt City Councils needs to pass a tougher by law which gives the Council more teeth to force the building owner to cooperate. Seize his buildings and sell them off. If he owed money to a bank there would have been a mortgagee sale long ago. So get tough!

The CBD looks like the remains of a lengthy civil war which has left bomb craters and damaged and deserted buildings.

Artwork will only be like a curtain drawn over the debris and decay. The sculptures previously installed have done nothing. Horses in shop windows and The Mall also did nothing. I hardly think artwork of any sort will bring people to the CBD.

Please! No more hospitality venues. We have enough. The development at the old Courthouse site will have a restaurant. The CBD is full of eateries and nothing has changed in the CBD.

Beggars are a nuisance too in the CBD. I have repeatedly been approached by a woman wanting to ask me a question. I keep walking but I have heard from others that she asks for money and then gets aggressive if you refuse. Beggars will deter people coming to the CBD.

Don't forget that retailers are also suffering as discretionary income has been eroded by your Council's reckless rate increases. Some people are paying \$400.00 a month in rates! That's in addition to mortgage, insurance, power bills and food. It is only going to get worse next year with high water bills hitting households. People are choosing now between food and paying rates and the mortgage and next year the high water bills will hit the fan and the heat will really be on household budgets.

# How are we doing? A regional snapshot of voter enrolment

With local elections fast approaching on 11 October, we looked across the Wellington region to see how Upper Hutt's voter enrolment rates stack up and where we might want to focus our efforts.

### Upper Hutt: 90.74% enrolled

As of 31 July 2025, Upper Hutt enrolled 33,955 eligible voters out of an estimated 37,311, a solid enrolment rate of 90.74%.

A strong turnout overall, but we're mid-pack in our region.

Here's the regional snapshot:

### What does this tell us?

Upper Hutt is sitting just above the national average, but behind nearly all our neighbouring councils, including Kāpiti, Porirua, and South Wairarapa, which are leading the pack.

Voting closes 12 noon, Saturday 11 October.

# Upper Hutt Economic Growth Policy: Brett Thomson

### "Region of Opportunity"

### Introduction

Upper Hutt is a fantastic place to live. We are blessed with natural beauty, strong communities, and a proud heritage. But many residents are telling me they are struggling with the rising cost of living, the lack of local employment, and ongoing rates increases.

The national economy is slow to recover, and the Wellington region is under pressure from cuts to public service spending. This has flow-on effects to our local economy — reducing demand for services, hospitality, and small business.

At the same time, Upper Hutt has more than 50% of its residents working outside the city. That means other regions benefit from the production, spending, and commercial rates that come with jobs, while Upper Hutt shoulders the infrastructure cost of housing growth. With more residential subdivisions and not enough commercial/industrial growth, the rates burden falls unfairly on homeowners.

If we do not pivot now, Upper Hutt risks falling further behind.

That's why I am standing for Council — to bring leadership that attracts investment, creates good local jobs, diversifies our economy, and builds pride in every part of Upper Hutt.

This policy sets out a clear vision: make Upper Hutt a region of opportunity where people want to live, work, invest, and visit.

#### **Vision**

Upper Hutt will be more than a commuter town. We will be:

- A place of opportunity where people can find quality jobs close to home.
- A fairer city where the rates burden is shared more evenly across residential, commercial, and industrial properties.
- A destination where visitors want to come, spend, and return.
- A proud community where each area of Upper Hutt has its own celebrated identity.

Our economy is currently anchored in the Wellington government workforce (public service, health, education, corrections, defence), which employs over 50% of our residents. Manufacturing and construction provide another 20%. This leaves us vulnerable.

The opportunity is to **diversify** into health, food, defence, digital, tourism, and advanced construction — while celebrating our environment and rural strengths.

By bringing new money into the city — through visitors, exports, and business investment — we create jobs, reduce rates pressure, and unlock more community services.

### **Policy Priorities**

### 1. Building a Destination Strategy

Tourism and events are not just "nice to haves." They are **economic engines** that bring in new money and jobs

- Major Events Hub Streamline processes to make it easier to host large-scale events (5,000+ visitors) in sport, culture, music, and lifestyle. Fast-track approval for smaller events under 1,000. Build on Upper Hutt's heritage of motorsport, festivals, and outdoor recreation.
- Bold Attractions Investigate a luge and gondola in the hills. This would put Upper Hutt on the map alongside Rotorua and Queenstown as a must-visit adventure destination.
- Signature Community Experiences Each suburb and valley should tell its own story. Councillors will lead community-led identity projects (Mangaroa = rural trades & horses, Whitemans Valley = lifestyle living, etc.), with locals developing signage and branding at no cost to ratepayers.

**Benefits:** More visitors, more spending, new jobs, boosted pride, and resilience against downturns.

### 2. Attracting and Growing Businesses

We must grow our commercial and industrial base to share the rates load and create sustainable jobs.

- Health & Medical Precinct Position
  Upper Hutt as a healthcare hub, attracting
  doctors, specialists, and medical equipment
  manufacturing.
- Industrial Precinct Development Open new industrial land for businesses that bring in revenue from outside Upper Hutt. Diversify the rates base to reduce homeowner pressure.
- Rural Innovation Back landowners to explore agritourism, boutique food and beverage, rural trades, and small-scale manufacturing.

**Benefits:** Local jobs, diversified economy, lower rates burden on residents, and transformation from a commuter town into a hub of opportunity.

### 3. Growing a Stronger Local Economy

Small business and entrepreneurship are the lifeblood of a community. Council should reduce barriers and provide an environment where local enterprise can thrive.

- Back Entrepreneurs Create a supportive environment for start-ups in hospitality, digital, creative industries, and tourism.
- Strengthen rural economic activity –
   Encourage high-value food production
   (vertical horticulture) using modern growing
   techniques that use minimal land but
   produce export-quality products.
- Expand the Commercial Rates Base –
  Right now, residential homeowners bear
  too much of the load. A fairer balance
  requires targeted growth in commercial and
  industrial sectors.

**Benefits:** More diverse economy, better jobs for young people, fairer rates, and more opportunities across all communities.

### 4. A Shared Task for Prosperity

Economic growth is not just about Council — it's about all of us.

- Families Supporting each other's goals and ventures.
- Communities Shaping their local identities and celebrating what makes each area unique.

- Communities Shaping their local identities and celebrating what makes each area unique.
- Council's Role Opening doors, reducing red tape, and championing big projects that bring in outside
- Councillors Leading community identity projects, ensuring every area has a voice and a plan for how it wants to develop.

Principle: When each of us succeeds, we all succeed. Prosperity is shared.

### Conclusion

Upper Hutt is at a crossroads. We can continue as a commuter town with rising rates and limited opportunities - or we can build a region of opportunity where jobs are close to home, rates are fairer, and visitors want to come and spend.

This policy sets out a clear, practical pathway to achieve that. It balances big ideas with community-led initiatives, investment with fiscal responsibility, and growth with pride in who we are.

These are the bold projects that will **redefine Upper Hutt's future** and make our city a true regional connector. They are more than just transport projects — they are **lifelines for a struggling Wellington region**, creating jobs, fuelling growth, and building resilience for decades ahead.

#### · Remutaka Tunnel:

- A once-in-a-century project that would reshape the movement of people and freight between Upper Hutt and Wairarapa.

- Opens the door to an **eco- and adventure-tourism hub**, showcasing our forests, rivers, and trails. Imagine Upper Hutt as the gateway to both the Remutaka Ranges and Kāpiti Coast, with cyclists, hikers, and visitors fueling our local economy.

### • Funding with Vision:

- Both the Remutaka Tunnel and Great Akatarawa Road can be toll-funded, backed by long-term New Zealand investment such as the Superfund or KiwiSaver.
- With fuel and time savings outweighing toll costs, these projects will **pay for themselves many times over.**
- They will breathe new life into Wellington's struggling region, turning dangerous, outdated passes into modern corridors for all.

   Akatarawa Road. These are nation-shaping projects
   that require serious investment. Advocacy here is
   critical and it's an area I know well. I will bring
   Upper Hutt's case to the decision-makers in
   Wellington, relentlessly.

### **Why This Matters**

These projects are more than asphalt and concrete. They are about:

- Immediate employment: Local contractors, trades, and suppliers gaining steady, well-paid work.
- Smarter movement: Faster, safer journeys for families and businesses.
- Economic revival: Making Upper Hutt and the wider Wellington region more attractive for investment and business.
- Social connection: Better links to Wairarapa, Kāpiti, and Wellington mean stronger communities and opportunities for all generations.

This is about getting the fundamentals right, enhancing our corridors, and boldly connecting Upper Hutt to the future. We can build roads that serve not just vehicles, but people, jobs, and communities. By doing so, we will transform Upper Hutt into the regional connector it is destined to be.


