Why have we created this new collection space?

Manga are one of our fastest growing collections. Increasing popularity and improved availability of quality translations have opened up a whole new world of captivating stories and characters to readers.

Meeting demand, we decided to highlight this upand-coming story format, and to make titles easier to browse and discover. Both keen manga fans and customers making first forays into this genre will enjoy the new collection space, housed right beside the graphic novels.

Reading across formats: why manga matter

As of 1 October, only 21.20% of eligible Upper Hutt voters have returned their voting papers.

With the 2025 local elections closing in ten days, we are urging residents to return their papers early and encourage friends, whanau, and neighbours to do the same.

Your vote matters. Local elections decide who represents you on Council and who makes key decisions about the future of our city, from funding infrastructure and community services to planning for growth and change.

Every returned paper helps ensure our community's voice is heard.

Voting papers were delivered between 9 and 22 September. You can return them by:

Orange bins - drop them at any orange voting bin across Upper Hutt. They can be found here (https://www.upperhutt.govt. nz/Council/Elections/Vote#section-3).

Voting closes at 12 noon on Saturday 11 October.

If you are not able to vote using the ordinary postal process, you may be able to cast a special

Special votes make sure you can still take part in the local elections.

You may be eligible to cast a special vote if any of the following apply:

- You enrolled online after 1 August 2025;
- You didn't receive your voting papers in the post by 22 September;
- Your voting papers were lost or damaged;

- Your details are out of date;
- You are on the unpublished (confidential) electoral roll;
- You have made a mistake when completing the voting papers.

Vijaya Dashami: Celebrating Triumph, Family, and Cultural Roots in Nepal and Aotearoa New Zealand

Upper Hutt, New Zealand- For Nepalese people around the world, Vijaya Dashami (commonly known as Dashain) is more than just a festival- it is the heart of cultural identity, unity, and shared joy. Marked as one of the biggest celebrations in Nepal, this festival carries deep religious, spiritual, and social significance.

Traditionally, Vijaya Dashami honours the victory of good over evil, symbolised by Goddess Durga's triumph over the demon Mahishasura. It is a time when families reunite, elders bless the younger generations with tika (a mix of yoghurt, rice, and vermilion placed on the forehead) and jamara (sacred barley grass), and communities come together with prayers, feasts, and festive gatherings.

For Nepalese families in New Zealand, the celebration of Vijaya Dashami carries a double meaning. While it connects them to their ancestral homeland, it also strengthens bonds within the diaspora community. In Upper Hutt, Wellington, Auckland, Christchurch, and across Aotearoa, Nepalese communities gather to share meals, exchange blessings, and recreate the warmth of home even while living thousands of kilometres away.

"Vijaya Dashami reminds us of who we are," says Dr. Ramil Adhikari, a Nepalese community representative in Upper Hutt. "It is about passing on traditions to our children while also celebrating the life we are building here in New Zealand. For us, it is a festival of belonging — to our roots and to our present home."

Many local Nepalese associations and cultural groups organise community events during this time, with traditional music, dance, and food. Temples across New Zealand also welcome families for special prayers, ensuring the spirit of Dashain continues to thrive far from the Himalayan valleys.

The festival also symbolises hope, resilience, and gratitude. In a world facing rising costs, global uncertainty, and busy lifestyles, Vijaya Dashami offers a moment to pause, reconnect with family, and remind one another of the importance of togetherness.

For the Nepalese diaspora in New Zealand, celebrating Vijaya Dashami means carrying forward the essence of home - the blessings of elders, the laughter of children, and the strength of community. It is both a cultural anchor and a bridge, linking generations and uniting two worlds-Nepal and Aotearoa.

Whakawhirinaki Silverstream Pipe Bridge officially connected up to the drinking water network – Official opening of the bridge yet to come

Whakawhirinaki Silverstream Pipe Bridge is officially connected to the drinking water network!

The cut-in works to bring the pipe bridge online wrapped up at midnight last Thursday after a massive 33-hour water shutdown, requiring careful planning and coordination.

The pipeline was recharged overnight, and valves restored the next morning. A huge shoutout to the project team and everyone involved for getting this work across the line.

Crews will now be focusing on pouring thrust blocks (concrete supports) around the pipe bends and reinstating the road surfaces. Final checks and adjustments will be made in the next couple of weeks. Traffic management will be removed from SH2 at Silverstream by the end of this week, and from Fergusson Drive in early November.

Thank you for your patience and understanding as Greater Wellington and Wellington Water work to improve the resilience of our region's water supply.

Accessibility Is for Everyone – Let's Build an Inclusive Upper Hutt: Angela McLeod

In Upper Hutt, around 11,000 of us live with a disability. But the truth is, far more people face barriers to participation every day — whether due to age, injury, pregnancy, or caring for young children. Accessibility isn't just a niche issue. It's a community-wide concern that affects us all.

If you've ever pushed a pram across a cracked footpath, struggled to find a public toilet while pregnant, or worn a moon boot after an injury (as I have), you'll know how frustrating and limiting poor design can be. These everyday barriers make it harder to participate in community life — and they're entirely avoidable.

As Upper Hutt grows — with our population projected to exceed 50,000 by 2030 — we must ensure our city grows in a way that includes everyone. That means designing streets, buildings, and services that work for all of us, not just some of us.

Yet, disabled people and others who experience barriers have had limited opportunities to influence civic decision-making. That needs to change.

My Plan for Accessibility (https://www.angelamcleod.nz/news/disability-accessibility-policy)

As Mayor, I will lead a Council that removes barriers and co-designs solutions with disabled people and tangata whaikaha Māori. My plan includes:

- Establishing an Accessibility Advisory Panel to guide inclusive decision-making
- Embedding Universal Design principles in public spaces

- Improving transport and movement options for all ages and abilities
- Ensuring digital services and events are accessible to everyone
- Building a disability-confident workforce within Council
- Publishing an annual Accessibility Scorecard to track progress

Who Benefits From Inclusive Design?

Simply put — we all do.

Inclusive design helps older residents with reduced mobility or vision, people recovering from injuries, pregnant women, parents with prams, and visitors unfamiliar with our city. When we make our streets safer, our signage clearer, and our services easier to use, we create a city where everyone can thrive.

The Barriers We Must Break Down

- Physical barriers like uneven footpaths, inaccessible buildings, and poorly designed transport stops make daily life harder for many.
- Digital barriers exclude people when information isn't available in formats like Easy-Read, NZSL, or plain language.
- Social barriers persist when there's low awareness of non-visible disabilities and limited representation in decision-making.

Accessibility isn't just about ramps and toilets — it's about dignity, independence, and equal opportunity. It's about making Upper Hutt a place where everyone belongs.

I support safer active spaces and believe EVERYONE has the right to get about the rohe* safely.

During this campaign we've been asked about cycleways, tactile tiles for vision impaired, wheelchair access to name a few.

What I know.

Central has removed funding for footpaths so any work done would be solely at the cost of ratepayers. Remembering too that Central funds aren't free money. It's your tax dollars.

I know there was a Council led project looking at the design of our active spaces because I submitted some ideas a few years back. I am unsure where this is at. Perhaps it was requiring funding from Central.

I asked a current councillor about cycleways and was advised that they were planning one along the railway tracks. The challenge has been pinch points. That being privately owned land.

Everyone walked or biked to school from primary age when I was growing up. In an ideal world walking and biking would be how we move around. Sadly, it has become a recreation. We even drive to the gym to walk for an hour. The reality is gyms provide safe environments to get fit and active.

Even if safer active spaces were available. Would we use them? Would our children walk/bike to school? Can we slow our current life down enough to be able to?

The answer will be different for everyone which is why really good community consultation is essential.

Kaitoke Regional Park bridge is the result of really good consultation. One of the people invited to the design process is reliant on a wheelchair for mobility.

Upper Hutt Grey Power

Local Elections 2025 – Lew Rohloff / Upper Hutt Grey Power Association

Grey Power has serious concern that the 'run away' inflation of Local Government rates in recent years, in terms of impact on low to median income households has exceeded all reasonable measurements of fairness, equity and, indeed; affordability.

The 'four well-beings' provision in the Local Government Act 2002 requires Local Government to establish 'affordability parameters' in long term and annual planning procedures, not only for council activities but also for rating revenue impacting on households. Councils have the legislative power to adjust the proportionate impact of rating on households to ensure the affordability principle is not breached.

Councils have not conscientiously employed this legislated safeguard. Effectively, while elected to represent low to median income households, whether property owners or renters: the financial security of such people has been compromised to favour development and economic growth.

Over the many decades since the early 1980's when Local Government began its divestment of internal planning and works teams and pursued its obligations through contracting via 'public and private' partnerships; 'community outcomes' in terms of 'value for money' and 'delivery of public services' have markedly deteriorated.

Councils and the Mayors who have led them have not demonstrated any sustained devotion to 'leadership' of a 'people first' orientation sufficient to reverse this undesirable social degradation.

This statement is derived from research based on anecdotes our vulnerable families are telling us. They identify the core contributing factors which are leading to rapid deterioration of public confidence in local government and, for that matter, central government's failure to adequately resource it.

Readers who are Grey Power members together with their families and neighbours will shortly be faced with the responsibility of electing a new Council. Do not vote too soon. Take the opportunity to hear the emerging issues to form an impression of the likely 'character' of the council emerging and then, importantly, the best candidate to lead it.

The Local Government team we choose must have the character to resist 'capture' by developer interests and it must begin to prioritise people and families wellbeing.

Look for a candidate who:

- In the legitimate interests of lower-income households, campaigns for central government funding of the 'growth' component in capital costs of infrastructural assets and treatment charges for 'safe' drinking water.
- Identifies an acceptable solution to the unsustainable 'user charges' on essential public services which government requires vulnerable households to bear at proportions far exceeding traditional benchmarks.
- Undertakes to inform communities of the adverse implications of legislative reforms and is prepared to facilitate and lead 'public interest' deputations to government ministries.

Grey Power Upper Hutt is making this statement to acquaint all candidates with the attributes sought from those who advance to represent their community for the next triennium.

Our monthly meeting to be held on Wednesday 17th September will provide an opportunity to hear Mayoral Candidates' responses to our 'public interest' expectations.


